
Kings County Museum

Loyalist House

Carleton Martello Tower

Reversing Falls Rapids Lookouts

The amazing phenomenon of the **Reversing Falls Rapids** is a sight to behold. If you time it just right, you can watch the Bay of Fundy's monstrously high tide reverse the flow of the mighty Saint John River, even as it pushes through a gorge formed by the collision of continents millions of years ago. Get a bird's eye view on the waves and whirlpools that result from nature's tug-of-war, at the Bridge Road lookout (200 Bridge Road), and Fallsview (100 Fallsview Avenue) and Wolastoq parks (228 Lancaster Avenue).

At **low tide**, the full force of the Saint John River rolls and swirls into the Bay, creating a series of whirlpools and rapids, while at **high tide**, the Bay of Fundy's tides rise, gradually reversing the flow of the river, forming rapids and standing waves. Between these two extremes comes a period of **slack tide**, where the two bodies of water meet with equal force, creating a brief period of flat calm. This is the only time sail boats and pleasure crafts can sail between the two.
